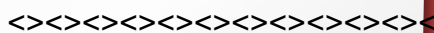

Fargo Moorhead Medicine Picking Adventure

Earlier this year, Bob Shimek, Ogema, MN visited with Deb Dorman and me about having people from Fargo travel to White Earth (WE) for a day. After a few emails and conversations, it was decided that Deb and I would invite people on a one day trip to pick medicines. On Wednesday, July 27, 2011, nine adventurous Fargo-Moorhead folks journeyed to White Earth for the day and they were: Clinton Alexander, Elverna Vilas, Jaclynn Davis Walette, Carol Davis (Belcourt), Prairie Rose Seminole, Renae Meier, Amber Mattson, Deb Dorman, and Jan Eliason.

The day began with the group meeting up at the truck stop on the corner of 12th Ave. north and I-29. After picking up the last few supplies and chatting about the anticipated day's events, the caravan of three vehicles drove east. All was going well except that I forgot to exit when the lead cars exited. This made for a good laugh when Prairie called me and said, "Uhm, Jaclynn we exited." To which I laughed and said, "I know. I was so busy visiting with my mom I forgot to follow you all." No worries, mom and I found our way to the Minwaanjige café near Strawberry Lake on the WE Reservation. This was the pre-arranged meeting point with Bob Shimek. After purchasing gifts, food, and coffee at the café the event began.

It began actually in the parking lot and grassy lawn of the Minwaanjige café. Bob Shimek addressed the group and reminded us to provide offerings for the medicines and healing that was forth coming. As he spoke, a bald eagle, miigizi, glided in from the east. As it approached, it slowly floated off in a northwesterly direction. Members of the group pointed as it flew by and out of sight.

We made our offerings and gathered cedar from the nearby cedar trees placing the green aromatic medicine in plastic, recycled grocery, or brown paper bags. When we had gathered only what we could use, we returned to our vehicles and drove north further into the WE reservation. Throughout the day, we would find ourselves driving on paved, gravel, grass, and even mud roads. The scenery was refreshing and often times breathtaking.

The next stop is where we gathered sage. It too is aromatic and plentiful, especially, in the spot from which we picked. The location is in the midst of tall pine trees, and the area made me think of a ceremony that I've experienced in Canada. Following the sage gathering, we drove to a place where we found swamp tea. Oh my, what a sight. The ground was greatly soggy, and it did sort of get dark as we walked off the road and into the

bush, but once we got inside the bush the place seemed almost magical, and I think someone may have made that comment while we were in there.

The final part of the journey, in which I participated, was to the land where Gladys Ray grew up. Gladys Ray lived in Fargo for many years before she passed away a few years ago. We stopped on the trail and set up a picnic. I forgot to pack the paper plates and when some four wheelers came four-wheeling by with what looked like their picnic supplies, some of us jokingly said that we should offer to buy some paper plates from them. Bob made a fire so we could roast hot dogs, and he even found us some large leaves to use as plates. I left the group after the picnic because my mom had to travel back to the Turtle Mountains yet that day. The others continued on with Bob to Round Lake and gathered sweet grass and raspberries.

Due to time constraints, we were unable to pick bitter root, and perhaps, someday this fall the Fargo-Moorhead group will gather once again at Minwaanjige café, make offerings, greet miigizi, and drive north to the bog which holds many more treasures of memories and healing.

Hello Friends!

We need stuff...lightly used kind of stuff. With this heat, its been difficult to think of the shorter days and colder nights that we'll be embracing after coming weeks.

Each month the Native American Center Project sees more than 200 individuals for referral services to the food pantry, local thrift stores, or other needs of emergency assistance. We're not able to always help, but we do our best to work with our coalition partners to meet the needs of our community. We have seen an increase in American Indian and non American Indian populations coming in to utilize our services, our technology corner or to be a part of our social and educational programming.

Our walk in traffic is repeatedly asking for clothing, shoe and hygiene items. Many thrift stores have limited what they are offering to individuals as well as setting monthly caps on their giveaway items that in some stores are dried up by the 5th or 6th of the month. We are also seeing a limited amount of aid coming from

faith organizations.

Every day we see individuals who have been wearing clothing items for more than one day, and with this heat, our offices have taken on a new kind of funky.

About the gathering

This symposium builds on work begun two years ago between tribal communities and the University of Minnesota. The first symposium (2009) brought researchers from the University together with tribal elders from across northern Minnesota. It offered an opportunity to share knowledge about manoomin and build a better understanding between native knowledge holders and University researchers on wild rice in a good way.

That initial gathering was very powerful and long overdue. One outcome of the symposium was a request by tribal members in attendance for more opportunities to share stories, research, and learning and build trust so that wild rice is appreciated as a sacred gift from the creator by us all--*this second symposium honors that request*. Another outcome of the initial meeting was to draft a wild rice white paper. This paper would identify issues where University and tribal interests could begin to engage in meaningful dialogue on wild rice research conducted at the University and offer recommendations for action.

The draft Wild Rice White Paper was completed and submitted in May 2011 to the tribal leaders of the seven Anishinaabe reservations for their review, comments and recommendations, and will be presented to the University of Minnesota.
